The seminar at Yad Vashem surpassed my expectations! Firstly, I learned many things about the Shoah that helped me draw a clearer picture not only about what happened but also why and how it happened. Visiting the Yad Vashem Holocaust Museum and relevant sites enriched further this experience.

The seminar was prepared in a very thorough way, each unit following logically from its previous and complementing it. The workshops provided further understanding on the material previously presented and gave some ideas on how they can be applied to Greek curriculum.

We were presented with a teaching methodology that can be applied to teaching the Holocaust but is a very powerful tool that we can apply to teaching difficult subjects of our own national history, like the Asia Minor catastrophe or the Pontus genocide.

All of the lecturers had very deep knowledge of their subjects, were excellent teachers, answered politely all of our questions and were very lively and engaging speakers.

I got acquainted with the culture and history of the Israelis. I got a more detailed picture of one of the oldest civilizations and through lectures on Judaism and antisemitism, I understood why some things happen the way they do.
